This whimsically illustrated picture book tells the story of four inhabitants of the forest who notice that branches and trees are disappearing from their forest home. They immediately launch an investigation to discover who is destroying their home. The culprit is soon discovered but his reasons for taking the trees of the forest are not what one might have predicted. Jeffers' story can be read at many levels and at many ages. The very young will enjoy the illustrations and trying to solve the mystery. Older readers can begin to see the connections between our actions and their consequences. Teachers could very easily use this picture book to discuss social responsibility and how one person's actions can have a much greater impact on others and the environment than one can imagine.
